Rev. Dr. Dietra Wise Baker - Getting Started in Grassroots Organizing in Your Community

Saturday from 9:15-10:15 am

Dietra Wise Baker is an assistant professor at Eden Theological Seminary, the organizing director of Eden's Gamaliel Race and Power Institute, and the faculty director of Eden's Center for Lived Faith and Organizing. Her expertise in anti-racism, youth ministry, prison ministry, chaplaincy, and faith-based community organizing makes her a uniquely valuable organizer, preacher, trainer, teacher, and consultant.

Do you want to start a social justice ministry in your community? Are you aware of the problems in your community, but unsure of where to start? Are you worried about being too political? This workshop will root you in your faith and the beauty of the Bible and theology. You will practice proven organizing skills and leave the workshop with a plan of action.

Rev. Dr. Stu Merkel - Spiritual Formations for Everyday Life

Stu Merkel has served as pastor of Faith Community Church in Franklin, Wisconsin, since 2009, and previously pastored churches in San Diego, California, Hartford, Connecticut, and Gurnee, Illinois. An MDiv and DMin graduate of Fuller Theological Seminary, Stu is a lifelong Congregationalist, a creative preacher, and a spiritual leader. He teaches Spiritual Formation for the NACCC Lay Ministry Training Program.

This workshop will provide an introduction to spiritual formations and the practice of spiritual disciplines common and useful for everyday life. Using daily practices, participants will be guided to a greater understanding of essential pathways to experiencing God. Spiritual disciplines deepen your source of hope in a time of radical change.

Rev. Dr. Lonnie Richardson - Building a Culture of Discipleship

Lonnie Richardson is the founding pastor of Fox River Congregational Church and has experience serving rural, urban, and university congregations. Committed to providing relevant ministry and leadership driven by the transformational possibilities of the Christian faith in people's lives, Lonnie's passion is to help people connect with God and realize their full potential as followers of Christ.

Building a Culture of Discipleship is a practical, hands-on workshop designed to help leaders, pastors, and ministry teams cultivate an environment where spiritual growth and disciple-making are the norm, not the exception. Rather than relying on programs or one-off events, this workshop focuses on embedding discipleship into the everyday life of your church through intentional relationships, clear vision, and consistent action. Participants will leave equipped with tools to assess their current culture, identify barriers, and create a sustainable path forward where discipleship becomes who you are, not just what you do.

Rev. Dr. Patrick Hunt - God's Will for Your Church

Patrick Hunt has served as the pastor of Heritage Congregational Church since April 2007 and as a chaplain for the Berea Police Department since 2016. Additionally, he has served in the Ohio Association of Congregational Christian Churches and has been an active leader within the NACCC. Patrick began his ministry in Chicago in 1969 and has served in many pastoral ministries since.

In the NACCC, our churches tend to see themselves as small, aging congregations, and trending smaller. That sentiment raises a question as to whether these churches are in a precarious position or a position poised for growth. Through the question that God asked Moses in calling him to go to Egypt, "What do you have in your hand?", this session will encourage us to assess where we are and allow God to use our current resources toward our future growth.

Rev. Dr. Beth Bingham - Back to the Future

Beth Bingham is a senior minister at the Congregational Church of the Chimes in Los Angeles. A graduate of Cornell College, Yale Divinity School, and Garrett Seminary, Beth's ministry has included roles in Christian education, hospital chaplaincy, and numerous leadership positions within the NACCC, including on the association's Executive Committee and Board of Directors.

Simply put, Beth believes the past that we Congregationalists cherish holds our future. In this session, we will consider how, as churches gathered around covenant, we are uniquely poised to invite those who are searching for faith and community in our complicated and chaotic world into our fellowship.

Rev. Dr. Lisa W. Davison - More than a Wom(b)man; Prophetic and Liberating Women; Wise and "Witchy" Women

Saturday from 4:15-5:15 pm and 7:30-8:30 pm; Sunday from 6:30-7:30 pm

Lisa W. Davison is Vice President of Academic Affairs and Dean at Phillips Theological Seminary. An ordained minister and author, Lisa has served congregations in Texas and Kentucky and published multiple books and essays with a focus on Hebrew Bible studies and women in the Bible. She has a BA from Lynchburg College, an MDiv from Brite Divinity School, and an MA and PhD from Vanderbilt.

The Hebrew Bible contains confusing and often contradictory messages about many different issues (e.g., sacrifice, war, the nature of God, and so forth), but there seems to be one message that is perfectly clear: a woman's main purpose in life is to bear children, specifically to birth sons. Through the session, *More than a Wom(b)man*, we will explore the question: Can we find another understanding of a woman's worth, besides motherhood, in the Hebrew Bible?

In the session *Prophetic and Liberating Women*, we will begin our search for childfree women by considering the biblical stories of female prophetic characters Miriam, Deborah, Huldah, and Esther, who are never described as mothers nor as "barren" within the texts. What roles did these female characters hold in the story that give them importance beyond their reproductive capabilities? Have we missed some of these other positions because of our own limited perspectives in reading the biblical texts? How can these stories empower all of us to be "Agents of the Divine?"

Finally, in *Wise and Witchy Women*, we will look at some lesser-known female characters of the Hebrew Bible and explore how they are examples of female roles not based on the ability to produce offspring. We will consider what we've learned about the Hebrew Bible, its socio-historical contexts, female biblical characters, and understanding of womanhood, both ancient and contemporary. How can this new knowledge challenge us to break free of preconceived notions and limitations on how the Holy calls us to be agents for change?

Tim Uthmann - Come to the Table: Healing Hearts, Bridging Divides

Sunday from 3:30-5:00 pm

Tim Uthmann is the executive director of the Pilgrim Center for Reconciliation, where he strives to bring hope and healing to those in need. From his early days studying the Bible and theology to opportunities to pastor churches in crisis to his work supporting global missions with the International Association for Refugees, Tim has long been drawn to helping people grow into who God created them to be.

Throughout Scripture, imagery of “the table” inspires a picture of connection and hope. It is both an invitation to healing as God does deep work in our souls and a place to invite others as we reflect that healing into the world around us. During this workshop, we will consider how truths gleaned from reconciliation ministry around the world over the past 30 years may be particularly helpful in our own churches and communities today. Come to our table (er, um...conference room!) for an interactive, practical conversation about the work of Shalom in our world.

Rev. Dr. Gerry Krupp - What's Happening in the NACCC

Gerry Krupp is the executive director of the NACCC. He holds a degree in Political Science and Christian Ministries from Indiana Wesleyan University, an MDiv from Fuller Theological Seminary, and a DMin in Preaching from Trinity Evangelical Divinity School. With 30 years as a minister and 11 years in church and nonprofit transition work, he strives to help NACCC churches grow and thrive.

Join us for the breakfast session, *What's Happening in the NACCC*. Drawn to the “thin places” between the performing arts and the sacred, she makes connections between theatre and theology in her ministry.
