Victor was a gifted vocalist and songwriter. He created the Chandler High School Gospel Choir Club. Under his leadership, the choir performed at local events and at venues with renowned groups such as the Harlem Gospel Choir and the American Rock and Roll and Soul show.

Rev. Hardy passed away in March 2025. Victor and his wife Cynthia were a dynamic team. He is lovingly remembered by her and their adult sons who continue to carry forward his legacy.
